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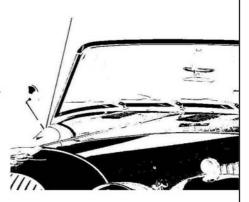


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#### A Letter from our Vicar

#### Advice from the Church of England during the Coronavirus [COVID-19] closure:

Taken from the Church of England website: Correct as of April 2020

#### Can banns of marriage be called?

Banns can only be called within the context of the principal service of public worship in a parish church on a Sunday. Given that there will be no public worship taking place, Banns cannot be called.

#### Can weddings still go ahead?

Sadly there can be no weddings taking place in church buildings until further notice. A wedding requires a minimum of five people to be present and this exceeds the numbers which the Government restrictions currently permit to gather together in one place.

#### What about emergency weddings in hospital, hospice or at home?

The Faculty Office will continue to facilitate the issue of a Special Marriage Licence for a Church of England/Church in Wales wedding to proceed in a hospital, hospice or at home where one of the parties is terminally ill (whether through Covid-19 or otherwise). Clearly, any decision to proceed with a wedding in these circumstances will, as always, be one for the clergy and parties and will need to be based upon medical advice and with social distancing policies and guidance applied as regard the officiant and witnesses. The permission of the hospital or hospice authorities will always be required in writing.

#### Can baptisms go ahead?

Emergency baptisms can take place in a hospital or at home, though subject to strict hygiene precautions and physical distancing as far as this is possible.

#### Can funerals still go ahead?

Sadly, funerals may now only happen at the Crematorium or at the graveside. Only immediate family members can attend (if the crematorium allows) – that is, spouse or partner, parents and children, keeping their distance in the prescribed way (this is true also for burial of ashes). No wake or gathering should be held following the funeral, and this should be scheduled for a later date.

We recognise how difficult this will be for many and add to the pain of a loss, and encourage you to discuss with your vicar or minister the possibility of a memorial service at a date in the future where more people can be present.

#### Should we still deliver the parish magazine or other printed communication?

Some studies suggest that Coronavirus COVID-19 can live on paper and cardboard surfaces for up to 24 hours, and so any paper delivery represents a transmission risk. Local hand-deliveries also mean a volunteer will touch gates and postboxes and may come into close proximity with those who may be shielding. For these reasons, parishes are encouraged to look to digital communication, and telephone calls to keep in touch. The

Government has designated postal workers and delivery professionals as key-workers, so any vital printed communication should be sent through the post.

#### How do I deal, or help others to deal, with loneliness and isolation?

Find simple ways to deal with loneliness and isolation.

- 1. Pray. Light a candle, if safe, and pray for hope, faith and strength to keep loving and caring for each other during this time of struggle.
- 2. **Talk about how you feel.** This may be difficult if you are self-isolating, but do use the telephone, internet, and social media. If you need to contact a counsellor this can be arranged by your GP, or via local agencies, or privately. The <a href="Samaritans are there">Samaritans are there</a> 24 hours a day, every day, and it's free to call them on 116 123.
- 3. Focus on the things that you can change, not on the things you can't.
- 4. **Look after yourself physically, emotionally, spiritually.** Plan in things that you enjoy at regular intervals during the day a TV programme, a phone call, a book, a favourite dish, a game.
- 5. Look after others. Even if only in small ways, but do what you can: a smile, a kind word, writing a letter or an email.

We were extremely fortunate to be able to have our planned Live Music Now Concert before the Coronavirus lockdown came into force. This was a most enjoyable afternoon for our members with Iwan Owen giving a superb performance on Piano. He did extremely well having to reorganise the whole performance at short notice due to Singer Suzi Saperia unable to perform under self isolation guidelines. Let's hope we can see them again in the very near future. Obviously Lunch & Linger will not start until we can all safely be together again and decision had to be made to postpone our May AGM for the foreseeable future.

Despite the lack of regular activities life has been extremely busy here. My telephone and computer are red hot! As early as the 16th March I had put in place arrangements with the Coop for Disabled Club and Poirier Foundation members. Groceries orders to be made through me would be picked as deliveries arrive and our taximan would collect and deliver orders to individual members.

At the same time our Winter Support Scheme was turned into Coronavirus Support Scheme and we published our own Emergency Plan. Winterton is divided in 4 zones and as soon as lockdown came into effect on the 23rd March we could deploy our volunteers on providing same support as during snowfalls: calling all people registered with us to find out immediate needs, establishing who needed shopping and prescriptions delivery, who would welcome a regular chat. We have over 120 households on our lists and I would like to thank Kathy, Nicky, Stuart and Kerrie for keeping in touch with all concerned.

On the 16th March Councillor Paul McCartan contacted me, offering donated items to distribute. It is a great pleasure to work with him as he is showing such a genuine interest in our members' welfare. He has worked tirelessly to put together a list of services still available in Winterton as early as 31st March and keeps updating this on his Facebook page as soon as changes occur. Thank you Paul for your hard work. It is much appreciated. Between us we have been able to assist others who are not on our lists. I would also like to thank Lisa our Town Clerk and our other volunteers Carole, Mike and Estelle who are running errands for our members as like all of them I am also confined to barracks! However unlike them I am not bored and to be fair I am dreaming of shopping lists!

We are delighted to have received generous donations to help cover costs of deliveries and purchase items to make emergency packs. Winterton Improvement Network gave £500, Mrs & Mrs Jackson £100 and today another £500 anonymous donation was received. Thank you to all for their support and generosity. Further good news came in the shape of an In Kind Donation voucher for £100 from The Blakemore Foundation to collect items from our local Spar store. I only put this application in last Tuesday. The Blakemore Foundation obviously recognises the urgency of distribution and puts all the other funders to shame. We have got 3 other applications pending but keep getting emails saying we need more time for decision. Most of them had said response within 14 days....when made nearly 4 weeks ago.

The Poirier Foundation is still a local good cause in the Co-op Community Fund. The amount raised so far has reached £569.79. With your support we can do even better. Can you please back the Poirier Foundation as your good cause? Your support can help raise more for causes in your community without costing you a penny. #### **Message from the Methodist Manse**

At the time of writing this message, the world is a very different place to what it was a few months ago. In fact if I'm honest, I'm not sure what to write. There are many people experiencing some form of loss – loss of job, loss of finance, loss of a loved one - and much more. However, what this time of 'lockdown' has done is enabled us to re-evaluate life and our priorities. This unprecedented situation has given us a chance to stop and take stock of the things that are precious to us. If you know me, you will know I'm no gardener but the other week, I had a couple of days off and so decided to 'attack' my garden. I learnt how to use the lawnmower and mowed the lawn. I learnt how to use an electric hedge trimmer and various other gardening equipment and chopped the hedges in the garden. Did I enjoy it? Not really. So why am I telling you this tale? Well, what I discovered was that apart from the various green leaves on the outer section of the plants, below was lots of (what I can only describe) as dead branches which lacked both leaves and colour. Which got me thinking about the account that Jesus gives in John's Gospel (chapter 15) about the Vine. In it, Jesus talks about needing to prune branches that do not bear fruit in order that they can bear fruit. I wonder if as a society, we have become too engrossed in 'I' – pushing for that next promotion, looking at how does something impact me - that we have forgotten what it means to be a community, to help, support and care for one another. To share both the joys and the sorrows. Although I must say, that in all the places I've lived in the past 15 years (and there's been a few), Winterton is one of the few places where they do care about their community. But that said, I wonder if we can do things better? I wonder if there's a neighbour or friend that you've not touched base with for a while? I wonder when we emerge from this situation, if we will value life far more and therefore want to continue caring for each other and be more community orientated than self-orientated? I wonder in the analogy of the Vine, if this is a chance for us to bear more fruit?

So to those of you that are key workers – THANK YOU for all that you do and to everyone stay safe and stay well.

#### **Outing to Lincoln**

The club outing was to Lincoln to attend the L.A.G.C & M.C. [ed. Lindsey Association of Girls Clubs and Mixed Clubs] Annual General Meeting. This had been eagerly anticipated



by all of the club members who were looking forward to meeting members from other clubs throughout the whole of Lincolnshire.

Eventually the day arrived and the club members assembled outside the Vicarage complete with [or without] packed lunches, macintoshes and a very varied collection of musical instruments which could be carried in the pocket. [These were for entertainment on the journey home].

At about a quarter-to-two the 'bus arrived carrying some Burton club members who were to travel with us. There was an orderly queue formed and everyone managed to find a seat and

we were on our way.

The journey was uneventful except for some very out of tune singing. The first sight of Lincoln was that of the Cathedral shrouded in a mist directly ahead of us. We were soon in Lincoln stopping just past Newport Arch outside Bailgate Congregational Hall. When we entered the hall we found that it was packed with people waiting for the Annual General Meeting to start. way to the Cathedral where we were shown such things as the Magna Carta and William the Conqueror's throne. After a very instructional tour of the Cathedral all the members went back to Bailgate where the Social Evening started with various games. These were quite good and started the evening going with a swing. Then for everyone's amusement and entertainment came something which was the non-dancer's dream. Here the members were introduced to a form of American Square Dancing which was simple, novel and very exercising. With dances such as 'Bingo' the evening really went with surprising quickness. These dances were to everyone a new entertainment so that even the shyest of people could dance whoever they wished to ask.

The dancing was interrupted for a short time while refreshments were handed round. After the refreshments there were some novelty dances such as penny waltzes, snowball waltzes, spot waltzes and finally to end the evening 'Auld Lang Syne'. This ended a very enjoyable evening and there was a general rush for the bus which was to take us home. Everyone was very tired and really glad to get to bed.

The outing had been both instructional and entertaining and a good time was had by one and all. An outing of this type was almost perfect as it suited everyone's varying tastes and all the members are looking forward to the next one.

#### Re-discovering and re-wilding a 'lost landscape': Lincolnshire's Ancholme Valley

Re-discovering and re-wilding a lost landscape is being organised by the South Yorkshire Biodiversity Research Group with Sheffield Hallam University. Funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, it is set to run over the next two years.

The 'lost' landscape' project is taking place in the remarkable and unique Ancholme Valley primarily in the area north of Brigg towards the Humber Estuary. It will combine ecological and historical information with research into memories and reminiscences of recent landscape change, and the drainage of once-extensive wetlands. Starting at the present day, it will peel back the layers of history to discover hidden landscape heritage and biodiversity. Much of this heritage still exists in the countryside fabric of this lost wetland landscape —in hidden river courses, ponds, meres, streams, old lanes and greenways, derelict farms and cottages, and more. The place-names and lanes tell a story of landscapes past, and the buildings and families bear evidence of the changing communities. Documentary research and historical ecological records will add to the window from the past.

Investigations will be carried out in association with volunteers from local communities and there will be a series of ecology and heritage events/training sessions in landscape history fieldwork, biodiversity survey techniques, and archival research. The activities will help create an eco-historical record of this remarkable but under-appreciated landscape, and of the communities that have inhabited the area throughout its long history. These historical landscapes and their very special heritage will be brought back to life with written outputs plus computer graphics and artwork to create written and visual interpretations available on the project website. All the materials will be presented as online resources and there will be a downloadable wildlife and heritage trail.

#### A Vision for a Wilder and Wetter Ancholme Valley

Part of a once-vast wet landscape covering several thousand square kilometres of east England, the Ancholme Valley was drained in the late 1600s and its river straightened to run due north and discharge to the Humber estuary. Since that time, the valley and its wider countryside have developed into a rich farming resource with community and nature at its heart. However, today problems such as climate change, sea-level rise, increased flood risk (frequency and intensity), ecological extinctions, and both soil loss and degradation threaten major changes. With much of the area already at around sea-level this landscape is vulnerable to major changes in the next fifty years or so. Furthermore, for various reasons the economy of the region from Scunthorpe to Grimsby has been in long-term decline, and the rural tourism economy of the region underperforms badly. Yet the area has many positives with a rich heritage of local farming, a unique history and landscape, amazing potential for wildlife, and vibrant local communities too. Furthermore, there are excellent transport links into the region.

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Things are changing and the Ancholme countryside will need to adapt to future challenges and especially to a wetter climate and landscape, and higher sea-level. We can either work with the changes or against them, and it is surely better to anticipate future scenarios and grow a sustainable, resilient countryside and regional economy for the generations to come. Adapting to change and working with nature may mean some lands will be wetter and many areas will be farmed differently. However, this VISION is one of a wetter countryside yes, but also one with a vibrant farming economy and community at its heart. Developed effectively, a wetter Ancholme can be a growth-pole for regional leisure and tourism economies, a wonderful wildlife resource, and an attractive countryside too. As an artery linking the great Humber Estuary, the beautiful Lincolnshire Wolds, the coastal marshes and sand-dunes, and the heart of rural Lincolnshire itself, the Ancholme can be transformational for the region and bring enormous benefits to people, nature, and the economy.

We are seeking opinions, ideas and partners to bring about changes over both the short-term and the longer timeline. The vision harks back to the river's origins at the core of old Lincolnshire, but is not backwards-facing. This challenge is to look forwards to a vibrant and positive future and to a richer countryside in every way that reflects the farming traditions of a unique region. #### The Church Archives for 1917. Another time of national crisis

At the present time of national crisis it is perhaps appropriate to think of other times when the nation has been called upon to change behaviour. You may think immediately of the horrors of the world wars and of the rationing during WWar2 but you may not be aware of the situation for Winterton citizens in 1917 during WWar1. In the church archives is a copy of a royal proclamation issued by the King which had to be read out in church on four successive weeks. At the bottom the Vicar of Winterton, Revd Gibbons, has noted that it was 'Read publicly in church on Sunday morning 6th, 13th, 20th and 27th [of May]'. The proclamation reads:

#### BY THE KING A PROCLAMATION

#### GEORGE R.I.

We, being persuaded that the abstention from all unnecessary consumption of grain will furnish the surest and most effectual means of defeating the devices or Our enemies and thereby of bringing the war to a speedy and successful termination, and out of Our resolve to leave nothing undone which can contribute to these ends or to the welfare of Our people in these times of grave stress and anxiety, have thought fit, by and with the advice our Our Privy Council, to issue this our Royal Proclamation, most earnestly exhorting and charging all those of Our loving subjects the men and women of Our realm who have the means of procuring articles of food other than wheaten corn, as they tender their own immediate interests, and feel for the wants of others, especially to practise the greatest economy and frugality in the use of every species of grain: And We do for this purpose more particularly exhort and charge all heads of households to reduce the consumption of bread in their respective families by at least one-fourth of the quantity consumed in ordinary times; to abstain from the use of flour in pastry, and, moreover, carefully to restrict or wherever possible to abandon the use thereof in all other articles than bread: And We do also, in like manner, exhort and charge all persons who keep horses to abandon the practice of feeding the same on oats or other grain, unless they shall have received from Our Food Controller a licence to feed horses on oats or other grain to be given only in cases where it is necessary to do so with a view to maintain the breed of horses in the national interest: And We do hereby further charge and enjoin all Ministers of Religion in their respective churches and chapels within Our United Kingdon of Great Britain and Ireland to read, or cause to be read, this Our proclamation on the Lord's Day, for four successive weeks after the issue thereof.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham Palace, this Second day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and seventeen, and in the Seventh year of Our Reign.

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The background to this proclamation is that "..by January 1917 Germany was using submarines to try and sink all ships headed to Britain in an attempt to starve Britain into submission. Soon there were food shortages. To try and combat this threat to the food supply the government introduced a voluntary rationing scheme on 1 February 1917. The aim was to reduce the consumption of food in short supply and to show how to avoid waste when cooking. The scheme appealed to citizens to restrict their consumption to a weekly maximum of:

- 4lb of bread, cakes and puddings
- 2½ lbs of meat inc. bacon, sausages, game, poultry and tinned meat
- 3/4 lb of sugar

....... As bread and flour were increasingly ever hard to come by (in April 2016 Britain had just six weeks of grain supply left) the campaign encouraged people to eat less bread and use home-grown or substitute ingredients in their baking. This was one of the key factors in the popularity of the newly launched Women Institute, whose cake-baking demonstrations used vinegar instead of baking powder as a raising agent and jam preserved with salt rather than sugar." By 1917 all mills were put under government control, much pasture and other land was ploughed up for arable use and in 1918 ration books were issued which lasted until 1920.

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

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
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
