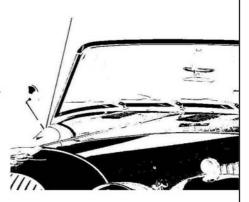

A Letter from our Vicar

Dear All

You won't need me to tell you how long we've been living in Lockdown. Like me, I guess you're ticking off the weeks on your calendars. And at the moment there's little, or no sign of a return to "normality", whatever that will be.

At the time of writing, I can confirm that the House of Bishops has been meeting, virtually of course, and is beginning to sketch out what returning to our churches might look like. Like everything else there is no hard and fast timetable for anything... But there is progress of a sort. Clergy are now permitted to enter their churches, for private prayer and / or recording or streaming of services. By the time you read this, hopefully we will have managed to do this. For various reasons I will only be doing this from Winterton All Saints, because we have the technology there and also running water and washing facilities. Streamed services will be available either to watch live, or to be picked up later, via:



At an unspecified time, further down the line churches will be permitted to carry out what the Bishops rather quaintly call "certain rites & ceremonies" in church. These I take it are probably funerals and later on weddings. But numbers will continue to be strictly limited and of course social distancing will be required.

Even further down the line will be a return to public worship, with restrictions on numbers, and the usual hygiene and social spacing rules. It may be some while before people can share the chalice at Communion, and of course that will continue to be a matter of personal choice. We may not be allowed to sing, as some scientists think that singing projects more virus infection (if you happen to have it) than coughing.

In the meantime please keep being hopeful, our God is still with us, and the Church is still here for you too. I'm trying to get round to everyone by phone or e mail, but if you wish to have a talk with me please feel free to get in touch.

Clergy access to churches

The House of Bishops' statement on 5 May 2020 authorises "very limited access to church buildings for activities such as streaming of services or private prayer by clergy in their own parishes, so long as the necessary hygiene and social distancing precautions are taken".

Can funerals still go ahead?

Sadly, funerals may now only happen at the Crematorium or at the graveside. Only immediate family members can attend (if the crematorium allows) – that is, spouse or partner, parents and children, keeping their distance in the prescribed way (this is true also for the burial of ashes). No wake or gathering should be held following the funeral, and this should be scheduled for a later date.

We recognise how difficult this will be for many and add to the pain of a loss, and encourage you to discuss with your vicar or minister the possibility of a memorial service at a date in the future where more people can be present.

Can wedding still go ahead?

Sadly, there can be no weddings in church buildings until further notice. It is not currently possible under English law for a wedding to take place using video conferencing technology without the couple, priest and witnesses being physically present.

Can baptisms still go ahead?

Emergency baptisms can take place in a hospital or at home, though subject to strict hygiene precautions and physical distancing as far as this is possible.

Customers at the Coop are still leaving items in our collecting bin. Councillor Paul McCartan keeps in touch with either redirecting donations of goods or enquiries for people not on our lists. Many of you will know that Winterton Open Gardens was to take place on July 18-19th, 2020. Sadly a decision to cancel the event was made early on in the 'lockdown' when it became clear that planning could not take place and there was no guarantee that it could be safely held under social distancing and other guidelines. Each year it has been held it has created significant interest and it has also contributed much badly needed funding to All Saints' Church in Winterton.

In its place All Saints will arrange a Winterton Virtual Open Gardens Weekend on 18-19th July, 2020. There will be an online collection of photos and short videos of gardens in Winterton. Any Winterton resident is encouraged to submit images/videos which can cover a range of ideas. There will be a link to the All Saints online fundraising page so that those who view the site online will have the opportunity to make donations if they wish. Those who submit images/videos will be encouraged to email family and friends to view the site when it is online that weekend.

You are invited to submit images/videos. Things you need to know about the images/videos required:

- 1. They must be taken in a garden/allotment or of a houseplant/window box in Winterton.
- 2. They may be taken at any time of the year.
- 3. They may show your favourite view [part of the garden, a close-up of a favourite plant or an aspect of wildlife in the garden] or anything which sparks your interest and gives you joy.
- 4. Short videos [ideally no more than 60 seconds] might show a walk in your garden or you carrying out gardening tasks.
- 5. Other ideas are possible such as before and after photos showing changes you have made to the garden or time-lapse images showing a blossom opening. Give your imagination free rein!
- 6. Each image/video to have your name and a title. If possible add a short sentence or two to indicate what is special/joyful about each image/video. We want to share happy thoughts as widely as we can!
- 7. Upload your entry before July 14th, 2020 so that there is time to create the site online. Details of special Facebook page later.
- 8. All Saints will retain final editorial control of which images are placed on its web pages.
- 9. Contact all your family and friends and ask them to view the site on 18-19 July. Explain that they will be encouraged to offer online donations to All Saints at Winterton as the real fundraising Open Gardens event had to be cancelled.

World War I Air Crash in Winterton

Estelle Mumby has unearthed a story which ended in tragedy for a young man called Albert Masters.

1st May 1918, Albert took off in Avro D173 from South Carlton airfield. He flew with eight other aircraft from 61TS. At around 10am just outside Winterton (possibly in the Carr Lane area), two of the aircraft collided. According to a local newspaper report, "One crashed through some trees, wrecking the machine and the pilot was killed. The other machine's propellors were broken and the airman escaped unhurt." Another Story from the Church Archives - Winterton Cemetery

The Town Cemetery opened in 1876 after the churchyard at All Saints was closed to most further burials. There had been some concern that the churchyard was becoming overcrowded and the Vicar reported this to the Local Board who were in charge of 'public nuisances'. A government inspector visited Winterton, his report went to the Vestry meeting and a decision was taken to create a new cemetery and to set up a new Burial Board to oversee it.

At the Vestry meeting a decision was made to borrow £2,000 for the new cemetery and chapels, The offer from Mr Dent to make available an acre of land close to the churchyard was turned down. Work began and the cemetery was completed in September 1876, a little later than planned. Queen Victoria's Order in Council dated 26 October 1875 stated that there were to be no new burials in the churchyard after 30 June 1876, except for the spouses of those already buried there. Then, on 7 March 1877, the Bishop of Lincoln consecrated the western half of the cemetery with its chapel for use by those belonging to the Church of England. The eastern half and chapel were for those of non-conformist beliefs.




Cemetery and two chapels from the south

The cemetery plots were divided into four categories. The cemetery plan below is coloured to show first class plots [those next to the central pathway], second class plots [those bordering the other pathways] and third class [those which were accessed by passing other grave plots or at the rear of the cemetery]. There was a fourth section put aside for 'Roman Catholics, unappropriated and stillborn'. This is listed on the key to the plan but not shown in colour. However, it is just possible to see labelling on the plan which shows that the extreme rear of the cemetery has Roman Catholics on the left, Unappropriated in the middle and Stillborn Children on the right.

The plan [see page opposite] shows the two chapels and also the cemetery keeper's house bordering on the public road.

In the church archives is the 1876 copy of the Table of Fees Rules and Regulations made by the Burial Board in Winterton [image below shows the front cover]. It makes clear that:

'The Burial Ground will be open to the Public under certain regulations daily on Sundays, Good Fridays and Christmas Days from 12.30 o'clock until sunset, and on other days from 9 o'clock until sunset. Children under 12 years of age will not be admitted except under the care of a responsible person. Visitors will be expected in



general to keep on the Roads and Walks and invariably to refrain from touching the Shrubs or Flowers and to observe perfect decorum in all respects. No DOGS will be allowed to enter the Ground. SMOKING strictly prohibited.'

The fees listed make clear the cost differentials between the different classes of plots. The charge for parishioners wanting a plot for an ordinary interment are:

> 3rd class 2s.0d 2nd class 7s 6d 1st class 15s.0d

but for any still born, or a child under 1 month old, the charge for interment in the designated area is 1s.0d

The charges for non-parishioners are doubled.

For those wanting to purchase a plot in perpetuity a 1st class plot is £2.0s.0d

The cost of a memorial tablet or window in one of the chapels is £5.5s.0d.




Cemetery Plan with coloured key for class of plots

There is one interesting item in the archives at Lincoln which relates to the Cemetery. There are letters between the Vicar [Revd E S Wilson], the Burial Board and the Bishop about the use of the church bells for funerals held at the Cemetery. It seems the advice was that the church bells could only be rung for funerals conducted on the consecrated half of the Cemetery. Then later advice was not to ring the church bells for anything happening more than ½ mile from the church. The Cemetery, of course, is almost exactly that distance.

A large wall-plan of the Cemetery was given to the church several years ago. It may have hung in one of the chapels. It is similar to the plan shown here but it measures some 154 by 103cms. It was rolled up in a metal tube. At the end of the plan were wooden poles from which to hang it.

The plan was in a terrible condition and it was given to the Conservation Department at the University of Lincoln for treatment. They allocated it in 2012 to a student, Connor Tulloch, for the project element of his course. He produced a report entitled 'Conservation of 19thC Varnished Wall-map Plan of Winterton Cemetery', a copy of which is in the church archives.

He wrote in his report 'At first glance the map was entirely illegible.....'. The varnish had turned dark brown, hardened and in many places cracked. The varnish had also collected much dust and debris. Storage conditions had led to the paper detaching form



the linen backing in places so that parts of the plan drawing were missing. As a result of his work, the plan was stabilised and missing parts of the plan redrawn. As he stated in his report: 'One of the main motivations throughout treatment was to enhance the legibility of the object. This was successful to an extent, the image remains partially obscured though greatly improved overall..... Consolidation of the fragile structure of the map was largely satisfactory....'

But it needs to be kept flat and horizontal and there is no location in All Saints where this is possible. So at the time of writing it is awaiting a final destination which may have to be the archive office at Grimsby [the local office for civil as opposed to church archives]. 


